Introduction

Ideas to achieve an "80% BSN-prepared" nursing workforce by 2020 are numerous. The New Mexico Nursing Education Consortium (NMNEC), a collaborative of 18 nursing schools, developed partnerships between universities and community colleges to award the BSN degree on community college campuses.

NMNEC Model:

This unique model includes a common curriculum and seamless transferability with three distinct degree options.

Building University/Community College Partnerships:


NMNEC developed a comprehensive *Implementation Guide* for partnering schools including a readiness self-assessment, partnership MOA, curriculum overview, steps for joint advisement, admissions, and the financial aid processes.

Co-Enrolled BSN Common Statewide Curriculum:

(nursing courses)

- > Term 1 = 2 CC courses + 1 Univ course
- \triangleright Term 2 = 4 CC courses
- ➤ Term 3 = 3 CC courses + 1 Univ course
- ➤ Term 4 = 2 CC courses + 2 Univ courses
- ➤ Term 5 = 4 Univ courses





BSN is offered on community college campuses. Baccalaureate and Associate degrees are conferred concurrently.

Partnership Details (Who does what?): Pre-Advising & Pre-req Work

Admissions

- Partners agree on # of seats
- CC student applies to CC
- Declare track of interest (ADN or BSN)
- CC selects BSN applicants based on selection criteria
- CC informs Univ of chosen BSN applicants
- CC BSN-track students apply to Univ & become "Co-enrolled Students"
- Univ and CC share student info

Co-Enrollment:

CC-Based Co-enrolled BSN students are simultaneously enrolled in CC and Univ BSN = Min 128 credit hours (nursing) (30 credits required from Univ)

Course Delivery of University Courses:

On the CC campus

Distance education delivery
Off-campus in home community

Faculty for University Courses:

CC Faculty hired by Univ
Faculty from Univ
Temporary Faculty

Tuition:

Co-enrolled Students pay CC tuition and Univ tuition separately

Financial Aid:

"Home" school designation reflected in MOA "Home" institution delivers financial aid

Co-Enrolled Student (two of everything):

- Student IDs
- Student Bursar Accounts/bills
- Student Financial Aid
- Student email addresses check both
- Learning Management Systems
- Student Services
- Library Services
- Parking Services

Graduation:

Co-enrolled Students are dual degree recipients – awarded BSN and concurrently

Two graduation ceremonies

- "Walk" in both
- Live Feed for distance participation
- Recorded for later viewing

State funding provided for conferring Both ADN from CC and BSN from Univ

Co-enrolled Cohort Reporting:
The NMBON recognizes the Univ/CC
Co-enrolled cohort as a separate entity

NCLEX Scores: Co-enrolled Students are reported as a separate Univ/CC cohort
