The New Mexico Nursing Education Consortium (NMNEC) is a collaborative of every state-funded nursing program across the state consisting of a common pre-licensure core nursing curriculum that supports multiple pathways into nursing.

The common statewide pre-licensure curriculum has the Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN) track embedded within the Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) track.

How Did the Consortium Evaluate the Statewide Curriculum?

The NMNEC Program Evaluation and Curriculum Committees worked together to simultaneously develop an evaluation plan with the implementation of the common curriculum throughout the state

How Can Statewide Evaluation Tools Facilitate the Accreditation Process for Individual Nursing Programs?

- · Aggregate data from faculty and students is collected electronically via online survey provider. All school identifiers are removed when data is reviewed
- Faculty complete the statewide consortium course report that fulfills the needs of the consortium and the individual
- · Schools can access faculty course reports and student surveys for their particular program for future reference
- Individual programs may access and utilize their own student data as best fits their needs

Initial Statewide Outcomes

Faculty Course Reports (Community College and University faculty teaching the common curriculum All course objectives were "met" or "partially met" with no course objectives noted as "not being met" Faculty Feedback



Comparing responses at different terms showed that students progressed from starting to think like nurses in the first term to immersing themselves in the profession of nursing in the fourth term

Breadth of Knowledge Surveys

Students reported they felt prepared for RN roles. When the results were analyzed for each term in the curriculum, there was no term where students reported significant differences in feeling prepared than what

Conclusions

- · Faculty report that course objectives (program objectives) are being met
- · Students perceive that the common statewide nursing curriculum is successful
- This type of creative statewide partnership development, analysis, and revision of common program evaluation tools is useful for both statewide program evaluation and for individual school program evaluation for accreditation and regulation purposes by all schools in a statewide consortium
